Important 2024 work:

- Served nearly 700 patients, providing essential healthcare services at no cost.
- Comprehensive care including wellness checks, chronic disease management and preventive screenings.
- Dental hygiene and tooth extractions, meeting a critical need for oral health care.
- We treat everyone with compassion and dignity, creating a trusted resource for vulnerable individuals.

A much needed lifeline for medical care for people in transition between jobs, housing, and primary care providers.

Important 2024 work:

- Hosted a 2-day Remote Area Medical clinic where 201 patients received free medical, dental and/or vision care
- · Helped hundreds of patients navigate complex social services and hospital systems.
- Served as a weekly collaboration hub for social service organizations to assist individuals & families in accessing housing, food and health care services.
- Our patients would not have access to care if our clinic didn't exist.

Important 2024 work:

- Visited 57 Vermont farms, orchards and businesses where 578 patients were seen by an RN, NP, or MD.
- Our Spanish-speaking intern (UVM MSW) assisted Spanish-speaking patients seeking mental health support. (48% of our patients identify as Hispanic Latino or Spanish)
- Provided 166 patients with dental work for a total value of \$349,712 through our collaborative dental program.
- Our staff health insurance assistant provided 293 patients with guidance navigating the insurance marketplace.

RUTLAND

Rutland County Health Partners

Rutland County Health Partners (formerly Rutland County Free Clinic) rebranded in 2024. Changing from "Free Clinic" to "Health Partners" eliminates the stigma associated with 'free clinic', and recognizes the many volunteers and partners involved in providing services.

Important 2024 work:

- 491 medical appointments were conducted by 22 healthcare providers, for patients ranging from age 20 to 90 always at no cost.
- Spending 200 hours in the field, our Homeless Healthcare program assisted 225 homeless adults in Rutland City, providing first aid, supplies and referrals for care.
- Our customized mobile medical unit arrived a project 3 years in the making! This will significantly expand our reach.
- Our Homeless Healthcare Outreach Program in Rutland served 361 individuals!

WHITE RIVER

Good Neighbor Health Clinic & Red Logan Dental

70 N Main St White River Jct, VT 05001

Cost-free care for individuals throughout the Upper Valley region. We serve individuals living across 22 Vermont and 16 New Hampshire towns.

Important 2024 work:

- Installed an innovative 'harm reduction vending machine', allowing individuals to access important supplies 24/7, year-round. This enables supplies to be available in a judgement-free, low-barrier, anonymous way.
- Hosted our first-ever community vaccination event, to prevent seasonal illness.
- Continued to run our small emergency food pantry, and participated in 10 weeks
 of 'healthcare share produce distribution' for patients with food insecurity. This
 resulted in 20% of individuals reporting a positive change in food security!

While we

primarily focus on helping patients obtain / maintain health insurance and financial assistance for medical care, many patients need additional support. We are pleased to work collaboratively with providers at Gifford and the Community Health Team to further support patients. Providers at Gifford ensure that patients' medical needs are addressed, and the Community Health Team meets challenges such as food insecurity, transportation and housing.

The full circle of support that our patients receive improves their physical, mental, and social health.

Important 2024 work:

- 1,508 interactions with 755 patients
- Assisted patients in obtaining Medicaid, Medicare and commercial insurances, and in completing financial assistance applications.
- Chelsea Boardman joined our team in October and leads support for patients. (Chelsea was hired after former lead Michele Packard retired after 26 years). Chelsea continues the tradition of providing exceptional care and support to every single patient.

SPRINGFIELD

Valley Health Connections

368 River St Unit 115b Springfield, VT 05156



In 2024, Valley Health Connections had its most impactful year yet, providing essential health access services to 1,829 community members across 55 towns. In addition to reaching more people than ever, we moved into a new location—doubling our office space to 1,400 square feet for our 4 full-time staff and 1 per diem employee. This expansion enhances

our ability to serve the community more effectively and comfortably.

Important 2024 work:

- Served 1,829 community members across 55 towns.
- Helped clients secure \$501,833 in free medications, significantly improving health outcomes for those without affordable coverage.
- \$10,587 provided for dental care needs.
- 1,342 individuals were assisted with Vermont Health Connect.
- 400+ community members were supported with Medicare navigation.
- 277 Medicaid applications were processed.

Emerging Strain on Our Network

Funding is more critical than ever.

Over 13,000

Vermonters per year depend on VFRC clinics as a vital resource for health.

Anticipated federal policy and funding impacts:

Rising Uninsured Rates and Increased Demand for Services

Medicaid Coverage Loss: Vermont healthcare leadership estimates 45,000 Vermonters with Medicaid will lose coverage under the One Big Beautiful Bill. Many of these patients will turn to the free and referral clinics for support.

Marketplace Coverage Losses: Many Vermont Health Connect enrollees will experience significant increases in their monthly insurance premiums. This too may lead to increased demand at free clinics as patients forgo insurance altogether or downgrading to a cheaper plan that exposes them to extremely high costs to access care at hospitals and other providers.

Eligibility Redeterminations Every 6 Months: It is a well-documented fact that increased bureaucracy leads to coverage losses due to paperwork issues. This will lead to more patients cycling on and off Medicaid due to variable work such as seasonal jobs, therefore seeking clinical and navigation services in our network.

Stricter Income Verification Rules: New hurdles for income verification will increase the number of eligible but unenrolled Vermonters needing care.

Patients Delaying Care and Arriving With More Complex Needs

Cost Sharing Burden: Starting in 2026, Medicaid recipients above the federal poverty level must pay costsharing fees. Patients who can't afford this may delay care until conditions worsen, arriving at clinics with more acute or unresolved chronic health issues.

Reduced Financial Flexibility for States and Clinics

Provider Tax Limitations: The loss of this Medicaid revenue to the state may lead to deinvestment in critical safety net/social services programs. It may also lead to loss of revenue at our local hospitals, resulting in restricting charity care programs, which already do not meet patient needs for help with medical bills.

Coverage Exclusions

Restricted Access to Healthcare Services for Patients with Both Legal and Illegal Immigration Statuses: There have been significant limitations put in place for patients who are not citizens to access healthcare services. The free clinics already act as key healthcare providers for these patients and this bill may leave the free clinics as the only option.

Ban on Gender-Affirming Care via Medicaid: Many free clinics offer LGBTQ+ and gender-affirming care. As access to these services for patients with Medicaid becomes more restricted and the attacks on Planned Parenthood's funding continue, our network may need to reposition ourselves as a safety net for these patients.

Administrative Burden on Navigators

More Complex Eligibility and Referral Processes: All clinics help patients navigate insurance and other social service program eligibility. Loss of insurance will change referral processes and more complex screening will place greater administrative burden on already limited staff.

Other Social Determinants of Health


Increased Need for Food Services: 13,000 Vermonters are estimated to lose their SNAP benefits due to changes in the program and thousands more will see their monthly stipend drop. The state itself will see the program become more expensive as costs are shifted to states. Clinics support patients with access to food in a variety of ways and are already seeing rising need so we expect this to increase as the changes are implemented.

2024 Finances

WORDS FROM PATIENTS:

Half of our collective funding comes to us as a Legislative Appropriation of \$1,584,252. Of that, 50% (\$792,126) is federal funding that comes to us for Medicaid Administrative Activities.
